

TRAIL MAP



CHEROKEE TRAIL

Length: 5 mile loop (white blazes)

Terrain: Dirt tread, moderate, some sections very steep (not for those with limiting physical or medical conditions)

Trail Head: Anywhere there is a parking lot

Features: National Recreation Trail. Loops around the mountain base, with a mile section going up and over the west side of the mountain (crosses the Walk Up Trail). Primarily passes through an oak-hickory forest, but views of the lakes, streams and mountain are common.

Dogs allowed.

Songbird Habitat Trail Area

LEAVE NO TRACE PRINCIPLES

- Plan ahead and prepare.
- Know the regulations and special concerns for the area you'll visit.
- Travel on existing trails.
- Walk single file in the middle of the trail, even when wet or muddy.
- Pack it in, pack it out. Pack out all trash, leftover food and litter.
- Leave rocks, plants and other natural objects as you find them.
- Observe wildlife from a distance.

NATURE GARDEN TRAIL

Length: 3/4 mile loop (green arrows)

Terrain: Dirt tread, easy, family-friendly

Trail Head: Parking lot off Robert E. Lee Blvd.

Features: A scenic loop through a mature oak-hickory forest community. Excellent for viewing shade-loving native plants. Small garden area at entrance with interpretive signs identifying native plants.

Dogs allowed.

SONGBIRD HABITAT TRAILS

Length: 1 mile loop each (red arrows)

Terrain: Dirt tread, easy, family friendly, meadow and forest habitat

Trail Head: Parking lot off Stonewall Jackson Drive

Features: Excellent birding spot. Meadow habitat planted to provide food for songbirds. Additional 1 mile trail through forest provides chance to see numerous native plants.

Dogs not allowed.
